# **Dr Who, Saturday BBC1**

Dr Who, played by Tom Baker, embarks this week on perhaps most important mission of his star-stepping career.

His great quest is to gather together the six scattered segments of the Key to Time.

any aspiring Dr Who assistant should remember three cardinal rules. Regard the monsters as real, keep your sense of humour and take a hot-water bottle to locations – they're

always freezing cold places.

Then you should have the time of your life. This advice comes collectively from a group of girls who should know what they're talking about: seven of the former *Dr Who* aides. All the girls remember the series with great affection. It gave them, at the time, a much needed leg-up into the telly world, put their faces before a huge public and helped along their future careers.

The only drawback, they say, is that once a *Dr Who* girl, always a *Dr Who* girl. The public of all ages has taken each of them into its heart and won't let go. But, they all reflect, how the girls have changed since those early days! have For while the monsters still menace, and evil men, as ever, plot to take over the world, today's *Dr Who* girl is quite a different species from her pioneer counterpart.

In the beginning she was shy, frightened, wide-eyed teen-ager. She has moved through the stages of being a dolly bird scientist, bright journalist and extra-terrestrial animal woman to arrive at last in the new series at the supreme position of Time Lady - the Doctor's equal. She has also got gradually livelier, and her liberation



has taken 12 years to achieve.

Far, far back in a different timewarp was Susan, 15 and the doctor's 'grand-daughter'.Carole Ann Ford, who played the first

Carole Ann, who hasn't been able to exterminate Susan from her life ('I still get called Susan, and asked for pictures from the series'), feels very jealous of the modern girls.

'Those lovely, sexy, independent parts weren't dreamed of in those days. I had to be childlike and terrified.'

Screaming Susan was followed by Victoria, a demure damsel



also desperately in need of protection. Deborah Watling, who took over as the girl assistant, agrees that the part is a much better bet now.

I was about 17 and had to scream all the time,' she recalls. And I managed to terrify one youngster in real life. I called one day at a girlfriend's house and her five-year-old brother opened the door. As soon as he saw me he shot up to his bedroom in terror and wouldn't come down until I'd gone. It took him six months to get over that experience. It brought home to me how real the series must seem to a child.



someone to be a kind of savage. The rest was up to me. seemed to work. I did the series for 18 months and am still known as Leela. When kids ask me for my autograph they say: "Put your real name in, write Leela". Though I had to have a lot of make-up to look right for the part, I'm recognised everywhere now.'

They have all gone their separate ways since starring in the series and have had varied careers. Carole Ann Ford. Wendy Padbury and Caroline John are now taking time off to bring up their families and are hoping to ease back into careers later. Liz Sladen is doing a series for Yorkshire Television, and Katy is happily ensconced in theatre work. But two, also both back in the theatre, are friends from years back. Now it's the turn of Mary Tamm. All the past girls say they will be watching the series to see how the next assistant shapes up. There's no doubt, they all agree, that Dr Who does something for a girl.

Mary Tamm reckons that as Romana' the Time Lady she will be the Doctor's intellectual equal. She said: 'I'm supposed to be bright, sophisticated and cool, but as I've only just qualified from the Academy, I have a lot to learn.'

Watch out for fireworks at first, though. The Doctor is very wary of his new assistant and is not too sure whether he likes 'Romana' all that much. Maybe she's just that bit too clever for him.

Tom Baker, the current and very famous Dr Who, has now had to cope with three quite different girl assistants.

'You get used to the way of working with one assistant,' he said, 'and it's always a bit of a worry when a new girl takes over. But all the roles seem to have been successful. I've enjoyed working with both Liz and Louise - as now I'm enjoying working with Mary.'

Only one thing doesn't change. However attractive the girls may look, the Doctor is never even slightly susceptible to their charms. No flash of thigh or fluttering of eyelashes can summon an appraising glance from the Time Lord.
